Narragansett Chief seeks legislation

WASHINGTON Narragansett Indian Chief Sachem Matthew Thomas is in Washington to lobby officials in Congress and at the White House for enactment of the so-called "Carcieri fix" -- legislation that would make it easier for certain tribes to secure a special federal trust status for their lands.

With time running out on the 111th Congress,

groups are anxious to pass legislation that would reverse a 2009 Supreme Court decision that effectively prevented the Narragansetts -- and by implication, other tribes -from getting the special trust status, which would put certain land beyond the reach of local and state taxes and regula-

Narragansetts have long argued that they seek the legislation

allies of Native American to protect tribal sovereignty over land in Charlestown that they acquired years ago for a housing project.

But many state and local officials, including Governor Carcieri, argue that the tribe could use the trust status to open a highstakes gambling enterprise that would not be available to other classes of citizens. The Supreme Court agreed last year in a decision that bears the governor's name. Indian

tribes around the country have since sought the "fix" bill to undo the high court's decision.

President Obama supports the tribes in this effort, as do a number of legislators, leading including the outgoing chairman of the Senate Indian Affairs Committee, U.S. Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D.,

But so far, Dorgan and his allies have been unable to secure passage of the legislation.

U.S. Senate finally passes Cobell settlement

MISSOULA, Mont. Sen. Max Baucus' office announced late this afternoon that the U.S. Senate has unanimously approved the \$3.4 billion settlement in Cobell v. Salazar, the 15year-old class action lawsuit that sought reimbursement for federal mismanagement of Individual Indian Money accounts. The case was settled early last December, but has experienced repeated hang-ups on the path to congressional approval this year. The Senate's vote today will

ultimately benefit more ing with various conthan 300,000 Native Americans nationwide.

"For too long, our American Indian brothers and sisters have waited for a resolution to an embarrassing example of government irresponsibility," Baucus said in his release. "Now it's time to keep fighting for good paying jobs and investment in education in Indian Country."

Lead plaintiff Elouise Cobell, a member of the Blackfeet Tribe and founder of the Native American Community Development Corporation in Browning, spent much of 2010 negotiat-

gressmen in Washington, D.C., in a desperate attempt to see the settlement passed. Had the Senate not approved it in the current lame-duck session, the case would have returned to litigation in early 2011.

"I want to thank Senators Baucus and Tester for leading the fight in the Senate to provide a long-overdue conclusion to this settlement," Cobell stated in Baucus' release. "Too many Native Americans have died waiting for justice. My greatest optimism lies ahead hoping that today's news gives way

to permanent reform in the way the Departments of Interior and Treasury account for and manage Individual Indian Money accounts."
